VSC Prexy Speaker At Eliz. City

PETERSBURG - The President of Virginia State College at Petersburg was guest speaker at the National Achievement Week program, held this week at Elizabeth City State University in North Carolina.

Dr. James F. Tucker spoke at a program in Moore Hall on the university campus at 8 p.m. at a program jointly sponsored by Delta Iota and Lambda Gamma chapters of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Incorporated.

His talk centered around the national theme of the fraternity, "STUDENTS PROTESTS: Helpful or Harmful. He addressed his audience from the subject, Students Protests: A Look Beyond the Frills."

Dr. Tucker said that the key to the question posed in the theme depends on the judgment of each individual student. He also said that this placed the student under tremendous pressure, and an obligation, to make the right decision at the right time.

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Dr. Nance Is Appointed To Exec. Committee

ORANGEBURG, S. C.—Dr. M. Maceo Nance, Jr., president of South Carolina State College, has been appointed to the Executive Committee of the National Association of State Universities and Land-Grant Colleges for a three year term.

The announcement was made by NASULGC at its 83rd annual meeting Nov. 12 in Chicago.

The executive committee is a 15-member body which meets several times a year between annual conventions of the association and acts for the association in the matters of business.
