

### Human Rights Day Is Set By Local Baha'is

The Baha'i Community of Raleigh is sponsoring the observance of Human Rights Day, Wednesday, December 10th. The meeting is open to the public free of charge and will be held at 2402 Van Dyke Ave. at 8:00 p.m. Mrs. Patricia Hillow, a graduate student in clinical psychology, will conduct the discussion.

Discussion will consider the basic human rights each person has and the problems created when these rights are denied to persons. It will also consider what has yet to be done and what should be done to raise the standards of equal human rights for all in Raleigh. Human Rights Day this year marks the 21st anniversary of the adoption by the United Nations of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Baha'i communities in over 2,000 cities will join in the observances of the day. Theme of this year's Baha'i observance is "Human Rights - A Universal Standard."

The Sunset Jubilaires and the True Lights will render a musical program at the First Baptist Church in Selma Sunday at 3 p.m.

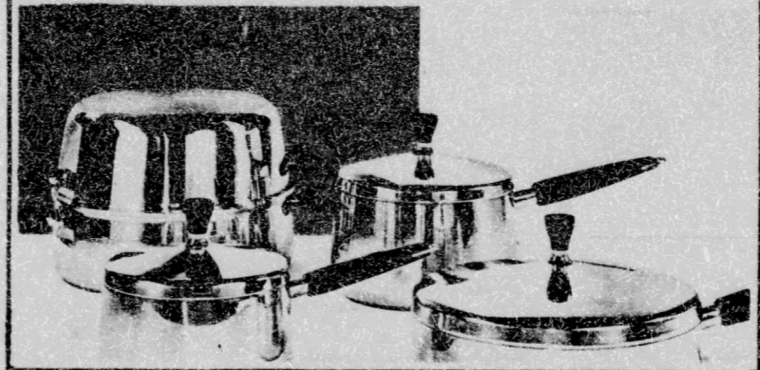
