HUD Reports FHA Yields Unchanged

WASHINGTON, D. C.—As of December 1, 1969, the average secondary market price for immediate delivery of FHA-insured 7-1/2 percent new-home mortgages with 30-year terms and minimum downpayments remained unchanged from a month earlier at \$92.3 per \$100 of outstanding loan amount.

The price stabilization was reported also in three of the six administrative regions, the Northeast, Southwest and West. In the Middle Atlantic area, the average dropped three-tenths of a point, while the North Central States in contrast reported an increase of the same fractional difference. In the remaining area (the Southeast) the lowest price of \$91.3 was registered, which represented a decline of one-fifth of a point.
