Charles R. Frazer, 90, Raleigh **Resident For 50 Years, Succumbs**

EAST ST. LOUIS, Illinois: Charles Rivers Frazer, Sr., retired educator, rusinessman, and author died here Monday. March 2. He was 90.

Frazer was among the last of a group of pioneer Negro educators who were prominent a half century ago. He was a native of Auburn, Ala., the son of Edmund and Estelle (Mitchell) Frazer and grandson of Joshua Frazer.


