Band Workshop To Va. State

PETERSBURG, Va.-The department of music at Virginia State College will offer a marching band workshop for band directors, starting July 27. Registration will take place in the lobby of the music building at 8 a.m. on the above date.

Band directors from Maryland, North and South Carolinas, Virginia and Washington, D. C. are expected to attend the music institute. The faculty and staff members will consist of Claiborne T. Richardson, associate professor of music and director of the Marching 110 band at the college; Robert Thomas, assistant director and arranger for the band, who recently returned to campus from Florida A&M University, Tallahassee; Morris Long, Virginia State College graduate outstanding twirler and a former member of the band; and other faculty and staff members at the college.

Four A&T Students Get Grants

GREENSBORO - Four North Carolina A&T State University students will receive full scholarships from the Gulf Oil Corporation next fall.

According to Vance E. Gray, director of student financial aid, four students in the University's Department of Mechanical Engineering will receive the Gulf Honors Scholarships.

He said the grants will include tuition, fees and books up to \$1500 and are renewable if the students maintain satisfactory progress in their programs of study.

Beginning next year, an incoming freshman will be selected in each subsequent year so that Gulf will have four continuing scholarships in force at A&T each year.

When the program was set up last year, Gulf had planned to introduce one Honors Scholarship a year to a freshman so that by 1972 and in subsequent years four students would be benefiting from this program.
