WALLACE WADE INTERVIEW

TO ONE BLACK BELT STUDENTS
Black students on number of campuses in Halifax County by a ratio of five-to-one according to an Entfield Progress story. The figures, purportedly submitted to the U. S. Circuit Court of Appeals at Alexandria, Va., in connection with the Scotland Neck School suit, where the legislature directed the town from the county in an attempt to reduce the ratio of difference in racial enrollment in the school which has previously taken in county students also. Reportedly, there are 9,391 pupils enrolled in the Halifax County school system, with 7,716 of them being Negroes, 1,440 are white and 225 are Indians (principally Halifax).

Interestingly enough, the town of Entfield, which was among the first communities in the area to start a "private school," (apparently to avoid integration) there are only 63 whites among the 481 students enrolled in the formerly all-white facility. Access to the previously all-black Inboden School has 1,130 blacks and 52 whites.

Some 900 white students are reported to have left the public schools since the implementation of court-ordered integration, representing 38 per cent of the total having gone to "private" schools. Halifax is one of six counties where Negroes outnumber whites—except at the pilot box.

BLACK PICKETS ARRESTED
Twelve black young people were arrested here Saturday afternoon while picketing illegally on crowded Main Street in the heart of the business district. The dozen youths and young adults taken to the police station and released on their own recognizance until trial set for Nov. 5. The city ordinance permits no more than five pickets to a block to gather and engage in any sidewalk picketing activity.

Officials pointed out that blacks have been granted permits to march here for five consecutive Sundays in protest following a Ku Klux Klan rally and cross-burning near the city limits.

The Negroes were refused a permit to march on Saturdays due to the weekend business rush. However, a small group, reportedly directed by a former Vietnam veteran, told City Council early in the week they would march—with or without a permit.

Provisionally, instead of a march, the oversized but orderly picketing resulted and averted an all-out confrontation feared by many. The blacks carried banners charging that the mayor would not meet with their group to discuss a long list of grievances which they had previously presented to the City Council and city manager; and said grievances would be carefully considered.

During the five weeks of agitation and Sunday marches (for which permits were granted) Milton Fitch and Golden Frinks,

SCLC field workers have been active here, resulting in a local nucleus calling themselves the SCLC chapter or committee, with outside influence and participants, have demanded among other things the return to active use the former BTW high school which was phased-out into the Rocky Mount Senior High last year. After a disturbance there a year ago, the school has operated with relative calm, despite probable pending court action due to failure to meet complete HEW standards of integration.
