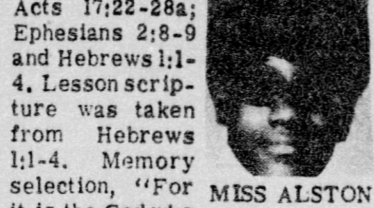

Jones Chapel choir sang, "All That You Need" and "I Got My Ticket."

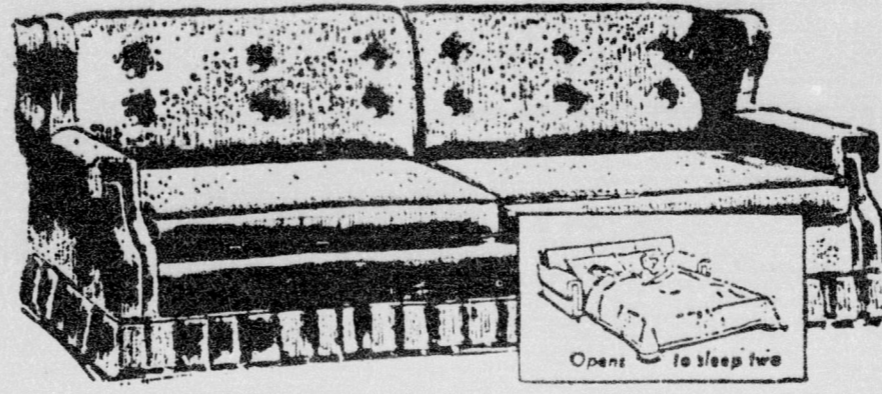

**HANDBOOK ON REHAB**  
The Department of Housing and Urban Development has awarded a \$750,000 research contract to the Arthur D. Little Company, of Cambridge, Mass., to produce a complete handbook for carrying out large scale rehabilitation.

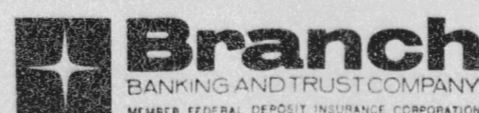
