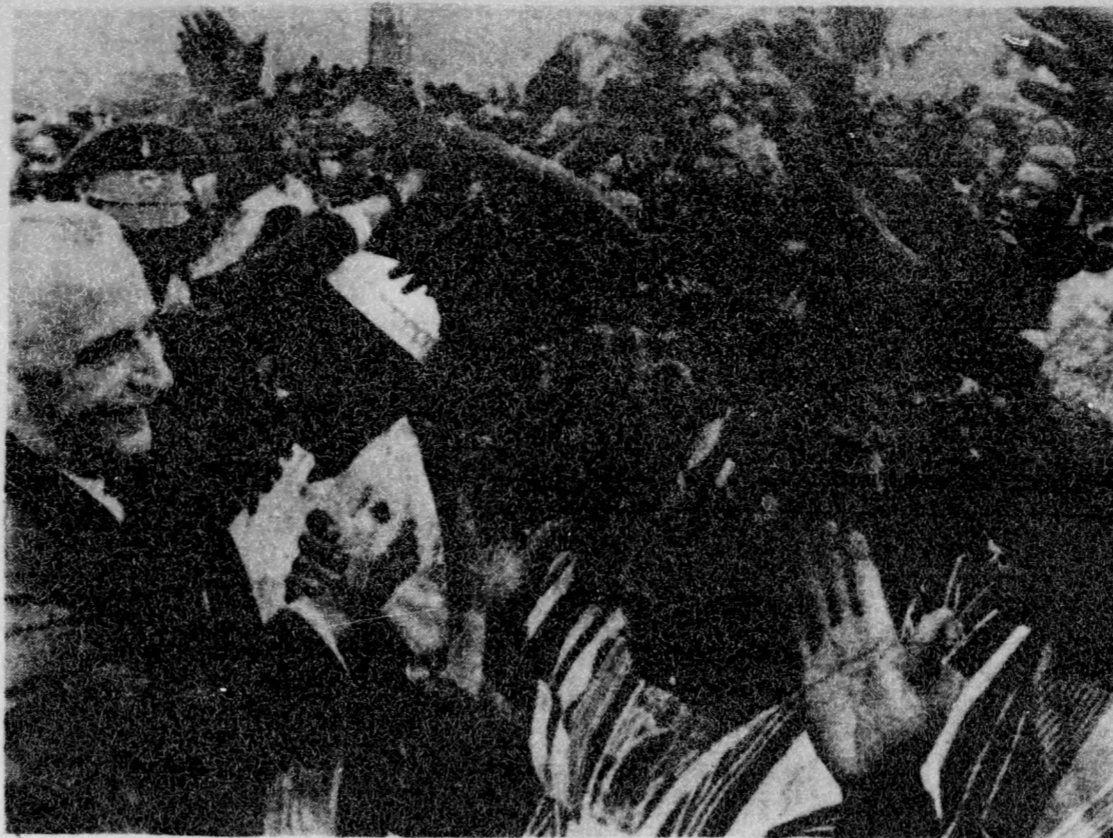
**JAIL ALLEGED FORGER**

**Utilities Companies Announce Formulation Of Big Proposal**

Five utilities engaged in the generation of nuclear power announced last Wednesday the formulation of a proposal for creation of an industry-owned company to underwrite nuclear property insurance. The proposal was developed following a series of meetings in recent months, and earlier studies by the Edison Electric Institute. The utilities involved are Carolina Power & Light Co., Commonwealth Edison Co., Consolidated Edison Co. of New York, Inc., Southern California Edison Co. and The Southern Co. It is expected that the proposed industry-owned company will alleviate cost and coverage problems related to currently available insurance, and such other matters as standardization of reserves, rates, engineering. The five companies have invited top officials of 28 other utilities, which are now or in the future expect to be in the nuclear power generating business, to an executive meeting in Chicago on Feb. 24 to discuss the proposal and prospective participation. If present trends continue, unemployment insurance benefit payments will reach \$4.9 billion in fiscal 1971, compared to \$2.8 billion last year.
