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

FAYETTEVILLE-Some forty alumni of Fayetteville State University, representing the TRAID CHAPTER, gathered recently at the King Inn Restaurant in Greensboro for their First Annual Dinner Meeting. The Group represented alumni from Greensboro, High Point, Burlington and Martinsville, Va.

Dr. R. L. Hannon, Director of Development and University Relations was the guest speaker for the occasion. In this talk, he highlighted the building program, scholarships, a cade mic affairs and institutional expansion. Dr. Hannon's major emphasis was placed on the topic of the high cost of operating an institution of higher learning and the needs of greater financial support for FSU by its alumni. He listed several reasons for the high cost of operating an institu-

(1) A demand for increased services by an increased number of students, (2) inflation, (3) special programs for the disadvantaged, (4) new curriculums, (5) increased salaries, (6) increased insurance costs, and (7) maintenance and in some instances graduate offerings.

The group discussed the Annual Fund Program and pledged to support the same.

A pictorial tour of the old and new campuses was presented by J. A. Fulmore.

A taped interview with Dr. J. W. Seabrook, President Emeritus of Fayetteville State University, proved to be very stimulating and exciting to all members.





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
