ATTACKED BY SEVERAL

He then proceeded to beat him up. He said his assailants discussed robbing him, but he didn't know whether they did or not. The complainant had been drinking heavy and said he could not identify any of his attackers. Street's report ended. He was treated and released at Wake Memorial Hospital for a concussion of the forehead and a cut over the left eye.

BEATEN AND ROBBED

He said the subjects appeared to be about 18 years of age.

As Employees Of Utility 'Flim Flammers' Posing

'Flim-flam' artists are again at work in the Carolinas posing as employees of power companies, according to a report to Carolina Power & Light Company by the consumer protection division of the North Carolina Attorney General's office.

Such imposters will tell their victim that his meter needs attention, his wiring needs to be repaired, or that they are surveying for a new power line and require an immediate deposit on the alleged work to be done. In all cases, money from the householder is the object of the game. In some cases, one imposter will divert the householder while an accomplice enters the house with robbery in mind.

CP&L recommends that if a stranger represents himself as a power company employee and

tries to collect money, the householder should call the power company for verification of the bill and identification of the person collecting it.

A U. S. French combine has developed a giant energy absorbing net to prevent end of

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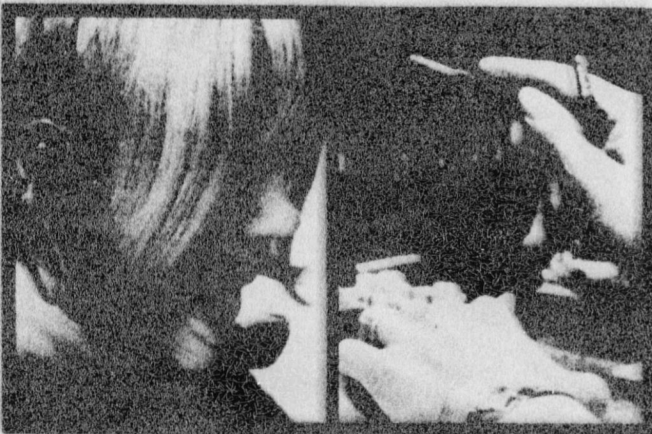
