Black Unemployment Critical

WASHINGTON - About 280 young men and women, mostly black, have just begun working in Labor Department offices throughout the country as Summer Aides. About 150 of these young people have been hired for jobs here.

The purpose of the summer aide program is to give enrollees work experience and a chance to earn money. The aides will perform a wide variety of duties during the program which ends in mid-September. They have been hired as clerks, engineer's aides, printer's aides, messengers and other jobs.

On-the-job training is the principal goal of the program,

but the young men and women also may receive training for special skills which they request. Regular staff members of the Department will supervise the training. Extracurricular activities also are planned, including production of a summer aides' news publication, meetings featuring guest speakers and field trips.

Selected through the U. S. Employment Service, the aides are earning \$1.60 an hour for a 40-hour work week, with 6 hours a week allotted to training and extracurricular activities.

Each Federal agency is op-

erating a similar program under the Federal Summer Employment Program for Youth. In setting up the program for this year, President Nixon said in a memorandum to heads of all executive de-

partments and agencies that in addition to students employed through the merit staffing, one needy youth should be hired for every 40 regular employees.

Hampton Starts Big Drug Battle

HAMPTON, Va. - Hampton Institute has announced that plans are being finalized for the inauguration of an Office of Education financed project to combat drug abuse. This project will be known as the Hampton Institute Drug Education Program.

An official of the Office of Education has stated that Hampton Institute is one of 20 colleges being funded to become models in a nationwide drug education program. Hampton Institute has been informed by the OE that a total of \$45,000 will be available for its 1971-72 drug education program when all aspects of it are approved. The target date for final approval is August 15, 1971.

The program will be student organized and student administered with some staff and faculty assistance.

Mr. J. Franklin, a consultant to the U. S. Office of Education, is working with the staff in completing their proposals for the inauguration of HDEP. Mr. Franklin is an associate of Dr. Helen Nowlis, author of numerous articles as well as the authoritative book, *Drugs On the College Campus*. Dr. Nowlis is regarded as the leading exponent on drug education in the United States.

The planning committee has held meetings with college officials, faculty members, and a wide range of community agencies and organizations. At a recent meeting, members were present from the Hampton City Managers office, the Hampton and Newport News Police Department, Board of Education, Peninsula Family Service, Peninsula Drug Council, Mayor's Office, Representative of the Governor's Council on Drugs, Chairman of Peninsula Mental and Retardation Board and others.

The staff has emphasized that this is to be an educational program for all Hampton institute students. It is being designed. It was stated, to help students develop among themselves the kinds of camaraderie that will lead increasing numbers of students to become involved with each other in their search for exciting, meaningful, dignified, and individualized life styles other than through the use of drugs and to help develop in students.

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
