The center, financed by a grant of \$67,220 from the Department of Health, Education and Welfare, is designed to provide full-time advanced training assistance for teachers and administrators who have been or may have been displaced as a result of the desegregation process.

The center will serve both North Carolina and South Carolina with each state hav-ing a field coordinator.


