ROCKY MOUNT—We are glad that Gov. Robert Scott spotlighted the nutritional report which showed that forty-three (43%) per cent of Tarheel's children subsist on sub-standard diets. Maybe parents and community leaders will start doing something about it. This writer has been mourning this fallure of mothers and parents in general to guide themselves and their juveniles into more adequate diets, rather than being too lazy to cook whole-some, balanced meals for their families. To this end the poorer people have suffered more than any others because they so often permit their families to eat mostly nick-nacks and drink soda-pop instead of proper food and drinking milk.

It breaks your heart to see our black folks carrying their six-bottle cartons of soft drinks and twice a day and never any milk at all. Then, recently, some young mothers are saying that the doctors recommend the giving of bottled-drinks to the babies in their arms instead of breast-nursing or giving bottled or canned milk! One would expect the parents to know better because the baby or small child does not. But when the child reaches advanced primary school and on up, he or she should have acquired that knowledge on its own, and be encouraged to carry it out.

We agree with correctional officials who say that instead of juvenile delinquency it is adult delinquency which has ruined our society and caused many parents to fear and run from or back down in the face of the demands of their children.
