Inc. (VEP), announces a barnstorm tour of Louisiana on August 2-5, 1971, in a concentrated effort to stimulate the political participation of approximately 70,000 unregistered black people in 15 parishes.

The Louisiana Voting Rights Tour will be concentrated in nine "Black Belt" parishes where black constitute a majority of the total population and in six other parishes with black political potential.

John Lewis, VEP Executive Director, and Georgia State Representative Julian Bond, a VEP Board member, will make 33 public speaking appearances on the four-day tour, delivering their non-partisan appeal in schools, churches, clubs, on college campuses, and other public arenas. Traveling in a motorcade,

Lewis and Bond will make frequent stops to engage in person-to - person canvassing efforts. Their personal appearances will include coffee clatches and door-to-door visits in many communities.


