R. Hatcher, Fr. Groppi Will Speak

NEW ORLEANS--The first black mayor of a major American city will travel South next week to tell a meeting of Catholic leaders what he thinks a major white religious body can do to help the nation's racial crisis.

Mayor Richard Gordon Hatcher of Gary, Ind., recently renominated by an overwhelming majority after a successful four-year term, will be a featured speaker at the biennial

convention of the Chicago-based National Catholic Conference for Interracial Justice in New Orleans.

He will be followed by a controversial white priest long active in the black ghetto of another northern urban center, Milwaukee's Rev. James Groppi.

The five-day convention, whose theme is "The Church in the City of Tomorrow", opens at Loyola University on Wednesday, Aug. 18.

"Mayor Hatcher's administration is earmarked by his ability to mobilize a wide range of resources, including religious and other non-profit groups, to aid municipal government in solving urban problems", said NCCIJ Chairman Walter Hubbard of Seattle.
