# R. Hatcher, based National Catholic Conference for Interracial Justice Fr. Groppi

NEW ORLEANS --- The first black mayor of a major American city will travel South next week to tell a meeting of Catholic leaders what he thinks a major white religious body can do to help the nation's racial

Mayor Richard Gordon Hatcher of Gary, Ind., recently renominated by an overwhelming majority after a successful four-year term, will be a featured speaker at the biennial convention of the Chicagoin New Orleans.

He will be followed by a controversial white priest long active in the black ghetto of another northern urban center, Milwaukee's Rev. James Groppi. five-day convention, The


