### "Search For Your Identity," Benedict's Chaplain Advises St. Augustine's Body

"People are unhappy and ill adjusted because they look inward instead of outward. They think too much about themselves instead of things outside themselves." This is what the Rev. Luns C. Richardson, associate dean of Benedict College, Columbia, South Carolina, told students and faculty of Saint Augustine's College as he spoke on the subject, "Searching for Your Identity," October 12. He said that real happiness and contentment comes not in what we have but in what we are doing, with and for others.

"It matters little, for psychological purposes, whether you interest yourself in making your town cleaner, in correcting injustices, in helping the poorer and the mistreated, or enlisting in a campaign to rid your city of illicit dope; whether you go in for boys clubs, voting projects, protest marches, research into ways of making the physical and social aspect of life better for all people," he continued.

"This is an age of Negation; of negative living, the 'beat generation,' and that seems very apt for the disenfranchised, fatalistic viewpoint

which prevails among so many young people. They voice a rebellious No to parental authority; a resentful No to teachers and counselor; an indifferent No to social and political responsibilities; a sullen No to the ultimate problems of life and the world; a defiant No to religious traditions and institutions, even to God Himself; a belligerent No to past, present and future," he stated.

"But such negation is not limited to a single age or class. All of us, regardless of age are being called upon to say No. There is something very honest and daring and realistic in this new attitude. It takes courage to say No when heretofore men have said only yes. However, while giving due weight to the No, let us remember that it is not the only word. We cannot live by negation alone.

Sooner or later, we must say Yes to something, even if it is only the utter futility and vanity of life.

"If we would find out identity, we must seek to find it in other human beings. If you live for yourself, you will be bored to death."

No one has learned the mean-

ing of living until he has surrendered his ego the services of his fellow man.

Today, now, right where we are, we must put into use our God-given talents and abilities. We must realize that God has a place for us, a place that only we can fill--and so, we must remain poised in His perfect peace, our attention centered firmly on the job ahead.

Filled with joy and enthusiasm, we can perform each task, aware that our success does not depend upon outer circumstances or environment, but upon living each day to the glory of our Creator.
