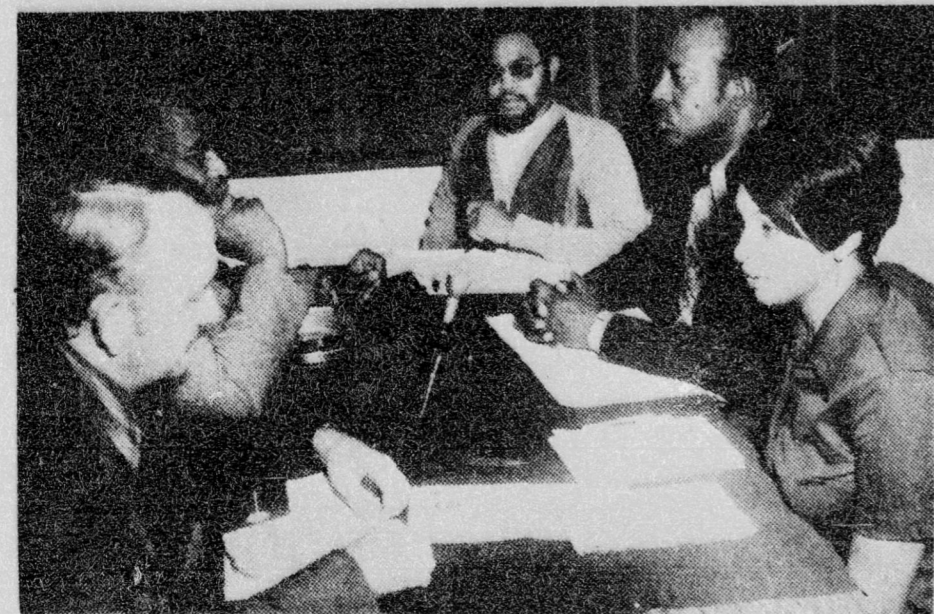

## Group Of Viets Write New 10 Commandments

A new "ten commandments" was written recently by a group of Vietnam veteran-patients in the Veterans Administration psychiatric hospital at Breckville, Ohio.

Younger veterans serving on the hospital's Vietnam Era Committee, which advises the hospital staff on how to better serve the needs of younger veterans, drafted the "commandments."

The full text, below, brought applause when read by Dr. Elaine Heath, staff psychologist of the hospital, at the recent national meeting of the American Psychological Association, in Washington, D. C.:

OUR TEN COMMANDMENTS  
I. Find yourself something to believe in--and be true to it.  
II. Be fair. Yours isn't the only bag around, and yours isn't

the only color.  
III. Be free. Do what you want unless it hurts someone else.  
IV. Use wisely. It's the only body you get.

V. Be strong. Don't compromise because of threats--or promises.

VI. Be peaceful. War destroys and gives no fair return.  
VII. Try to understand. It's what you expect of them.

VIII. Share. Someone else might not ever experience what you have.

IX. Keep the faith. If they won't listen to us, we've got time on them.

X. Above all else, LOVE! It is the only commodity this world has a gross lack of. "Positives rather than negatives are used," the patients added in a footnote, "because we are looking for positive action."

Sam L. Garner, head of the department of drama at Millbrook High School recently announced the following cast for the upcoming production of Neil Simon's "Barefoot in the Park"

Scheduled for production Nov. 19-21, the cast features Karen DiPietro in the leading role of Corie Bratter and Jesse Jones as her lawyer-husband, Paul. Nora Mansour plays the part of Corie's mother, Mrs. Banks, and Mark Dubowski is the Bratter's upstairs neighbor, Victor Velasco.

"Barefoot in the Park" will be the first production of the Millbrook department of drama for this year. A musical and a senior class play are planned for the Spring.

Under the supervision of Ernie Robertson who serves as technical director, some thirty students will work backstage for the production, included in this group are Pat Zander-science artist, Pat Hall-makeup, Roberta Cruze-property mistress, Patricia Jones-assistant to the technical director, Iris Womble-lighting, Tommy Diener-sound, and Julia Dixon who is assistant to the director.

The setting for the New York based play is being constructed under the supervision of Glen Sutherland of Millbrook Middle School.

Garner comes to Millbrook with credits which include the founding and directing of the City Children's Theatre in Wilmington; director of the state of North Carolina Children's Theatre at Flat Rock Playhouse in Flat Rock; three seasons

of summer stock with the S.R.O. Summer Theatre at the University of N. C. at Wilmington; and five seasons of instructing recreation creative drama classes for the city of Wilmington, Parks and Recreation department.

"This is our first season and we have many plans for the department. With the help of so many interested and talented students and the aid of the community, I feel that our plans will be successful," stated the director.

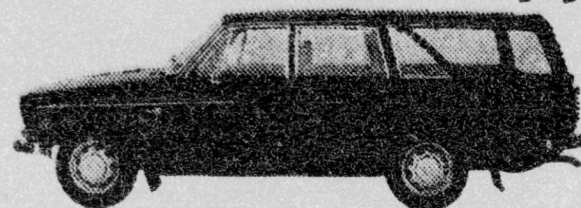
