

Dr. James M. Hubbard, Sr., Medic Of Durham, Dies At The Age Of 80

DURHAM - Dr. James M. Hubbard, 80, the man who founded the North Carolina College (now North Carolina Central University) Alumni Association, was buried here Tuesday afternoon in the Beechwood Cemetery.

Hubbard, a retired dentist and a native of Clinton, died Friday at his residence at 612 Dupree Street, Rev. Lorenzo A. Lynch delivered the eulogy at White Baptist Church where

men from all walks of life gathered to pay their final respect.

A graduate of NCC, Hubbard was the first alumnus and the second Negro to serve on the board of trustees at NCCU, a position he held at his death. He served as secretary and vice chairman of this board for many years.

He was a member of the North Carolina Central University National Alumni Association and was instrumental in the organization of the James E. Shepard Memorial Foundation. He served as president of both of these organizations for many years. NCC awarded Dr. Hubbard

the degree of Doctor of Humanities in 1964 and later named the chemistry building in his honor.

Hubbard, who is survived by three sons, was a member of the White Rock Baptist Church for nearly 50 years where he served as Sunday School Teacher, superintendent of the Sunday School and assistant chairman of the trustee board.

In addition to his sons, Dr. James M. Hubbard, Jr., of Los Angeles, California, Thomas Hubbard of Baltimore and Bobby Faison of New York City, survivors include four grandchildren, two nieces and one nephew.

40,000 Omega Men Launch Attack On Black Problems

WASHINGTON - One of the most complete and dramatic declarations of involvement in Black issues by college-based fraternity have been announced by James S. Avery, Grand Basileus of Omega Psi Phi Fraternity, Inc. As a result of discussions and panels by distinguished Black leaders and authorities at the fraternity's Houston convocation, the 40,000-man organization moved into nationally significant problem areas.

Among the fraternity members and leaders shaping the destiny of Omega's all-encompassing social program were Dr. Benjamin E. Mays, president emeritus of Morehouse College, Vernon Jordan, executive director of the National Urban League; Hobart Taylor, outstanding attorney and legal advisor to Presidents John F. Kennedy and Lyndon B. Johnson; Judson W. Robinson, Jr., Houston field councilman; James T. Felder, South Carolina State legislator; Edward Lewis, publisher and chief executive officer, Essence magazine; Dr. John L. Cashin, contestant for Governor of Alabama against George Wallace, and Dr. John L. The Omega Fraternity has given a national pledge to support and work at the local chapter level, the institutions and programs of welfare rights. The body resolved to push legislation which will secure an adequate

income for every family in America, especially Black families. In the same area of concern, Omega Psi Phi pledged support of all its chapters throughout America to fight Sickle Cell Anemia, a disease that penetrates the bodies of predominantly Black people. Financial assistance for research and other programs to stamp out Sickle Cell Anemia will be forthcoming from chapter and administrative levels of the fraternity.

Inequities in education were attacked head on by the Omega Fraternity. Quality education for Black children is the key educational issue in the 70's according to the body before its closing. In the communities throughout America, undergraduate and graduate Omega men are now committed to quality education. Pronounced drives in these communities by Omega men will be felt by Boards of Education, and school officials in the quest for quality education.

Being adept in politics was high on the list of resolutions. Omega has resolved to find, slate and endorse Black candidates and to work with other organizations who do this. The serious problems of voter registration, political education and complete freedom and equality in the political arena will get the full force and impact and support of the sixty-one year old organization.

Although we are 1/10 of the nation's population, we are 1/5 of the Democratic party and vote.

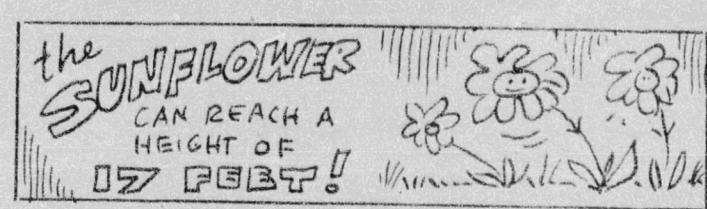

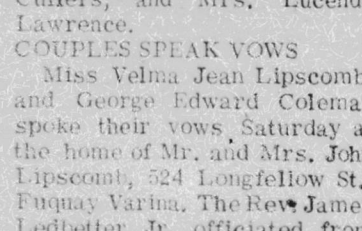

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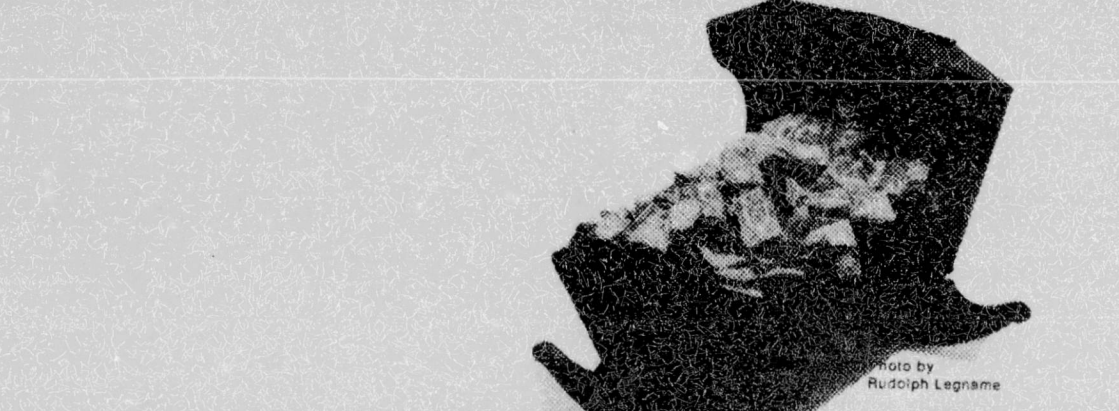
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
