"FINGERS" HUSBAND
Mrs. Carolyn Wilson, 23, 22-04 Gilliam Lane, reported to Officer E. W. Hamilton at 5:47 p.m. Saturday, that she and her husband, Perlie Ray Wilson, 24, were arguing and he struck her on the right arm. The woman was advised to sign an assault on a female warrant against her mate. She was not injured.

ASSAULTED WITH KNIFE
Miss Dianne Griffin, 22, 330 Dorothea Drive, informed Officers S. B. Price and F. L. Rountree at 11:05 p.m. Sunday, that she and two other women witnesses had become involved in an argument with Mrs. Willie Mae Crowder Hunter, about 24, 306 Battle Street, known to some as "Moochie." She declared that during the "fuss," Mrs. Hunter allegedly "drew a knife" on Miss Griffin and assaulted her about the face with it. Miss Griffin said she would sign an assault with a deadly weapon warrant against Mrs. Hunter. Miss Griffin suffered several superficial lacerations about the face, forehead, right ear and right hand. The incident took place at 800 Jamaica Drive. The witnesses were Misses Pamela McCullers and Peggy Griffin, both of 2805 Newark Drive.

SHOT IN BACK
Miss Rhonda Omega Bass, 18, Route 10, Raleigh, told Officer C. Troublefield at 10:02 p.m. Sunday, that she was shot in the back by an unknown subject in the 800 block of Fayetteville Street as she alighted from an automobile. The woman stated that she did not and could not see who shot her, nor did she know why she was ambushed. She did say, however, that she believed it was an accident and "the shot was meant for someone else." She sustained pellet wounds in the back.

STABBED IN BREAST

She said the man pulled a knife and stabbed her in the right breast, then he "split the scene." WOMAN KNOCKED DOWN
Mrs. Naomi Louise Miller, 42, 900 Peyton Street, informed two

officers at 11:58 p.m. Friday, that her husband, Ernest Miller, 49, "jumped on me at home and knocked me down." She said her head struck the dresser corner as she fell and he then continued to beat her. Mrs. Miller was treated at Wake Memorial Hospital for a split lower lip, numerous lumps about the face and head and for pulled out hair. She said she would sign an assault warrant.

REFUSES TO GIVE-CUT

Davie St., enroute to his home when three colored males stopped him and asked for his money. Robinson said when he refused, he was cut. The incident occurred in the 400 block of E. Davie Street.

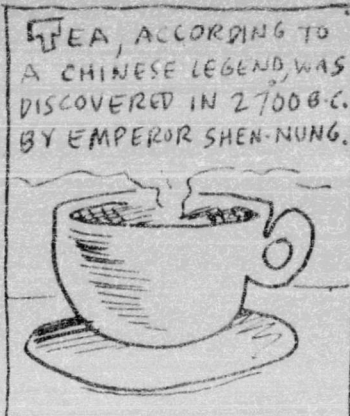

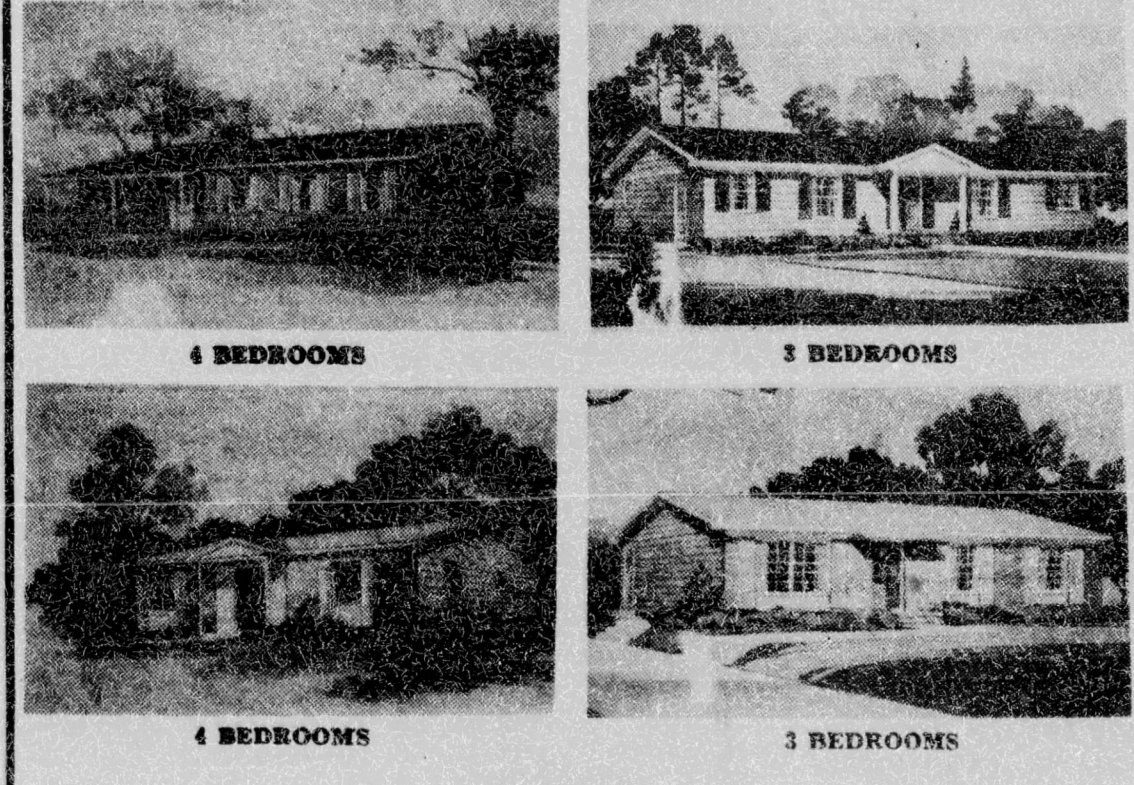
