SBA Has Banner Yr.

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Over 1971

WASHINGTON, D.C.--The U.S. Small Business Administration's 1971 Annual Report released last week reveals that small business received over \$2 billion in federal loans and contracts last year and as a result the SBA helped provide jobs for nearly one and a half million Americans.

The Agency reported it provided record levels of assistance to minority entrepreneurs during 1971.

Minority entrepreneurs in the United States which are considered small by SBA standards.

"Recognition of a more realistic business population is appropriate to the changes that are occurring in the technology of the whole business world with which the small business world increasingly will have to cope," the Report says. "These changes have already started and will become progressively greater in the 1970's. They point to a unmistakable fact that the primary requirements for entry and survival in business in the years ahead will be the acquisition of the appropriate technical and managerial skills."
