SBA Has Banner Yr.

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SBA Has Banner Yr. Over 1971

WASHINGTON, D.C.-- The U.S. Small Business Administration's 1971 Annual Report released last week reveals that small business received over \$12 billion in federal loans and contracts last year and as a result the SBA helped provide jobs for nearly one and a half million Americans. The agency reported it provided record levels of assistance to minority entrepreneurs during 1971. More than \$500 million in loans and contracts were provided for the development of minority enterprise. The report also states that based on U.S. Treasury Department business tax statistics, there are now approximately 8 million businesses in the United States which are considered small by SBA standards. "Recognition of a more realistic business population is appropriate to the changes that are occurring in the technology of the whole business world with which the small businessman increasingly will have to cope," the report says. "These changes have already started and will become progressively greater in the 1970's. They point to a realistic picture of the primary requirements for entry and survival in business in the years ahead will be the acquisition of the appropriate technical and managerial skills." BALTIMORE, Md. - One of America's most articulate Black leaders in the struggle for Black identity will be the featured speaker at the 105th session of Commencement exercises at Morgan State College on Sunday, May 28. He is the Rev. Jesse L. Jackson, the former director of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference's Chicago-based Operation Breadbasket who is now in the forefront of a new organization powerhouse, PUSH. Rev. Carter counted eight bullet holes in the window, a curtain and six bullet holes in the wall opposite the window. Three bullets were recovered at the scene. Grads Are Warned Of US Racism

CHARLOTTE-- A member of one of the nation's smallest minorities--The Black Political Officeholder-told graduates of Johnson C. Smith University Sunday "To not lose faith in the greatness of our democracy." Dr. James H. McGee, the Mayor of Dayton, Ohio, gave the commencement address to 220 graduates, the largest class in Smith's history. "There are those who will encourage you to destroy," he said McGee. "There are those who will have you believe that our country has failed us." "We all live in a democracy, with the wrongs that have been perpetrated upon us, that no one can deny, there is no country in all the world where so many share in the good things as we do here in America." McGee urged the graduates to pick up the struggle for civil rights but not to descend to Black racism. "Today, many of our black brothers glorify their blackness. They, like their white brothers, who gloried their whiteness, have made a virtue of color and tried to compensate for their shortcomings on the quicksand of race and perpetuate the racism that has surely affected all our lives," he said. "A racist is a racist, be he black or white, I challenge you not to stoop to the level of the racist," McGee said. Local Man, 40, Allegedly Blasts Home, Wounds Two

WENDELL - The whereabouts of a 16-year-old ninth grade student at Valden-Whitley continues to remain a mystery as of Wednesday morning of this week.

According to his father, Roosevelt Pearce, Jr., his son, Jimmy Lee Pearce, of Rt. 1, Box 33-A in Wendell, left home Monday morning, May 15 around 7:45 enroute to school at Valden-Whitley and never returned.

The younger Pearce was seen by some students in school as late as last Monday afternoon in the principal's office. However, he never returned home after leaving school that day. When he left home, he was wearing a pair of greyish-brown bell bottoms trousers, a dark brown short sleeved sweater, which zips in the front and a pair of blue tennis shoes. Pearce stands 5'9" and weighs between 165 - 170 pounds. He has a reddish complexion with light spots in his face and his hair is a dark sandy color. He had just begun to wear his hair in an afro hair style.

A reporter for the CAROLINIAN talked to Howard Todd, the assistant principal at Valden-Whitley Tuesday afternoon and he told the reporter, "Jimmy Lee Pearce was called to the principal's office around 3:40 on that Monday afternoon. The principal just wanted to see him about a matter. He has not attended school since that day." Anyone knowing the whereabouts of Jimmy Lee Pearce is asked to contact the Wake

Sense Of Oneness

A new sense of Black solidarity emerged among Black leaders at the close of a statewide conference on dual justice and political oppression which was held here Saturday, May 20. The conference was called by a coalition of Black leaders as a response to the illegal incarceration of Black community leaders including Rev. Ben Chavis, Dr. James Grant and others, such as, in Wilmington, Ayden and High Point.

After hearing national and state leaders attacking the criminal justice system as it now is constituted in North Carolina, a consensus of more than 300 voted to: 1. Call for an ecumenical conference of Black church leaders to develop a comprehensive program to combat white racism in the courts and prison system. This resolution coming from Black church leaders also urged local churches to aid political prisoners by giving financial assistance to their legal defense. 2. Voted to conduct a series of demonstrations of central prison early in June in conjunction with the North Carolina Black assembly to be held in late June. The conference instructed the steering committee to seek immediate relief for Black inmates against the prohibition of afro hair cuts. Another high priority on the (See SEES NEW, P. 2)
