Caucus Says High Court Was Right

WASHINGTON, D. C. - The Congressional Black Caucus is relieved by the humane and historic Supreme Court ruling on restricting the death penalty. We had hoped, however, that such a ruling would have eliminated the death penalty on all counts. This ruling is of particular interest and importance to Black Americans because of the high percentage of Black prisoners who have been sentenced to death.

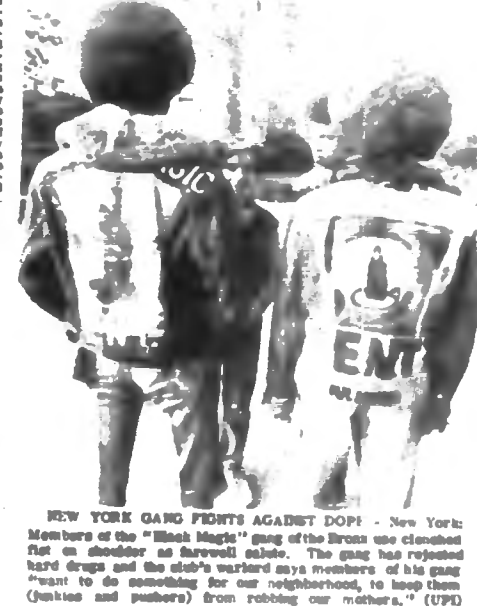

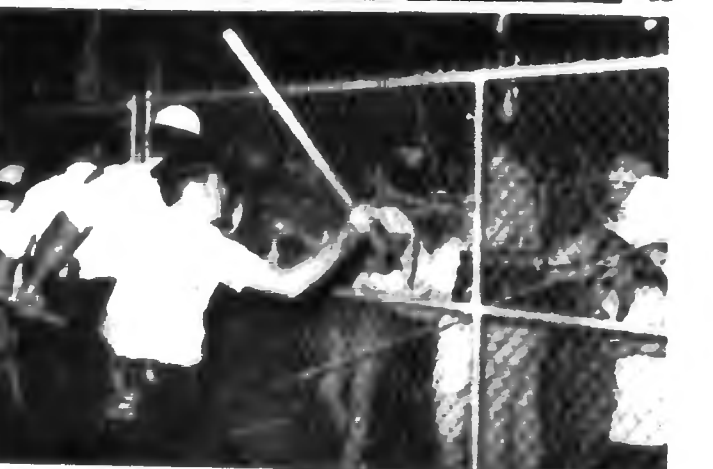
