DURHAM - Investigation was continued here Wednesday by the Durham Police Department in a shooting incident which occurred here early Monday morning, resulting in the death of a 40-year-old woman. As many as five men are being sought in the death.

Detectives and police continued to question witnesses trying to find out how many people were involved in the shooting attack at 183 Rosedale Avenue, which took the life of Mrs. Evelyn Gladys Evans.

Mrs. Evans, who will be buried Friday afternoon at 1:30 at Scarborough and Hargett Street funeral home with Rev. A. L. Thompson officiating. (See "BULL CITY" P. 1)

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Black Pride Awareness Recognized

SHOT AND CUT AT
Dunnell Donald Hicks, 28, 3023-A Woods Place (Method), told Officer A. C. Monday at 11:30 a. m. Friday, that Rufus Raines, 27, Route 2, New Hill, came to his apartment and dragged Miss Mary Louise Brooks, age and address not listed, out of his house and into the surrounding woods. Hicks declared that he was trying to get Raines away from the woman, whom Raines shot at him and cut of him with a knife. Hicks said he then went to call "the law," when Miss Brooks was assaulted. He said he would sign an affidavit with a deadly weapon warrant against Mr. Brooks. No injuries were reported. (See CRIME BEAT P. 2)

Claim Lonnie J. Davis Was Knifed By K. Dunn

By most of the many persons interviewed regarding the stabbing death of Lonnie Junior Davis at 10:40 p. m. last Saturday, he was described as "a God-fearing young man and a Christian." Davis was stabbed twice in the left chest and being held in the murder is 25-year-old Kenneth Dunn. The stabbing is said to have occurred at the home of Dunn, 1509 1/2 E. Lane Street.

Allard Alston Now Heads Durham FCD

DURHAM - It was announced Thursday that the Ford Foundation has awarded an additional one-year grant in the amount of \$400,000 to the Foundation for Community Development to continue its program of economic development in several black communities of the State.

This most recent action brings the total support from Ford for the 4 1/2 year old Durham based FCD to \$1,472,000.

Nathan Garrett, whose retirement as FCD's executive director, was announced two weeks ago, released the following statement: "This latest grant is clear evidence of the confidence which the Ford Foundation has in the board and staff of FCD to provide badly needed support to organizations of low-income people."

"Before making the grant, Ford took a close look at our program, the quality of our staff, and perhaps most importantly, at the image FCD enjoys among the thousands of people whose lives we touch."

Allard Alston, who replaces Garrett effective August 1, stated that the \$400,000 will be used to continue a program of support to organized groups of low-income people in establishing viable business ventures which will contribute to the economic growth of Black communities. These groups will also be assisted in developing programs and projects dealing with housing, health, social justice, education and other problems faced by them.

According to Alston, FCD will train twelve interns during the year who will be available to assist community groups in creating and/or managing early education centers and profit making businesses which will be locally controlled. Plans are also underway. (See FCD NEWS P. 2)

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A motive for the fatal stabbing has not been ascertained at CAROLINIAN press time, Wednesday, but it is believed that Davis and Dunn were "friends."

Davis was employed by Crown Zellerbach, Inc., in Raleigh, as a machine operator.

According to Police Captain James E. Stell, Davis was stabbed about 9:45 p. m., but did not succumb until around 10:40 that night.

A preliminary hearing has been set for Dunn on Tuesday, August 1, at 8 p. m.

On March 10-12, 1972, a National Black Political Convention was held in Gary, Indiana. The historic event brought together black people of all political persuasions to discuss and deliberate on issues affecting black people in the U. S. and the world. This second N. C. State Black Convention will be held Saturday, July 22. Over 8,000 people (4,000 delegates) were responsible for pulling together a National Black Political Agenda.

Former College Students Begin Serving Sentences

DENMARK, S. C. - Rather than continue to be hounded by South Carolina authorities, three "brothers" - Oliver Francis, Ali Raynor, and Alvin "X" Evans, former Voorhees students turned themselves in Friday, July 7, to begin serving time on charges that grew out of a 1969 Black student rebellion.

Later, school business managers O. H. White and the white trustees board chairman, J. Kenneth Morris, brought charges against the students. It was decided to pick 8 scapegoats and punish the brothers who spearheaded the student struggle on Voorhees campus.
