Hicks Is Businessman Of The Year

DETROIT, Mich. - "There is absolutely no doubt in our minds that our business will be successful."

The prophetic pronouncement was made four years ago by Jefferson Hicks, a 27-year-old Detroit Michigan's "Small Businessman of the Year."

In 1968, Hicks and Doris Reed, a husband and wife, organized a business called "The Move, Inc." with the primary goal of providing fruitful employment for unskilled and unemployed blacks.

The early going wasn't easy. First they needed a product to sell and a place to produce it. More important they needed customers.

Hicks hit upon a plastic memo pad as something he people could readily assemble and something that would enjoy volume sales at a low price.

Next he obtained use of an unused building that was formerly used as a housing

Beauticians Conclude Confab In Miami, Fla.

MIAMI Fla. - Dr. Katie E. Whickam, president of the National Beauty Culturists League, Inc., meeting in Miami, Fla. at the Dupont Plaza Hotel.

July 30 to August 10 says that beauty culture is the largest Negro owned and Negro operated business in the USA.

She stated that beauty culture had outstripped life insurance, undertaking, tavern ownership and other such and was proud of the fact that black women constituted the majority of the beauticians.

"Figures count," said Dr. Whickam, "and statistics from boards of cosmetology at various states show that there are by far more beauticians operating shops and schools and earning a gross amount far more than any other black project."

Louisiana has registered over 20,000 beauticians and of this number, over 14,000 are black. The state of Georgia has registered 21,000 beauticians and more than 15,000 are black. Florida has on its registered rolls 10,000 black beauticians. One figure adds to the number of registered another half as many who are not registered, who are what is called "bootleg operators."

Alabama has over 8,000 black beauticians, there are big men in black beauticians in the U.S.A. earning an approximate \$10,000 per week.

The beautician is not only the leading business person in the black group but she is also prepared for her business than others in their respective lines," said Dr. Whickam. She said that they started out straightening the hair with grease and heat. This required little training and skill on the part of the beautician.

They are now scientifically prepared to do their work. (UPI)
