The 106th General Baptist State Convention of North Carolina, Inc., will assemble all of the auxiliary bodies of the convention in all Baptist Assembly August 14-16, 1972 in the Capital City.

The convention is headed by Dr. C. R. Edwards of Fayetteville and Dr. G. J. Sherrill executive secretary.
