Young Black NC Cop Nabs Paroled Bank Bandit

Medgar Evers Fund Receives 250Gs Grant

NEW YORK, N. Y. - The Medgar Evers Fund received a grant of \$250,000 from the Josephine H. McIntosh Foundation of New York City to further the Fund's program of development for the Fayette, Miss. region. It was announced Wednesday by Fund President Charles Evers.

The grant was the largest received by the Fund in its three-year history, Mr. Evers noted.

"Our intentions in making this grant to The Medgar Evers Fund," Mr. McIntosh stated, "are to demonstrate our belief that blacks are capable of running a governmental system to acknowledge the fact that in the rural South such a black-run system starts off with several strikes against it—primarily economic and emotional and to buttress our belief that 'we-blacks and whites—must make it together, both for our collective benefit and to maintain this nation's strength, without which we will be a 'house divided.'" he added.

In expressing the Fund's appreciation, Mayor Evers said "this grant will enable us to sustain the momentum we have created in Fayette during the first three years in the areas of social and economic development."

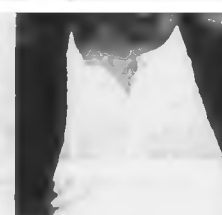
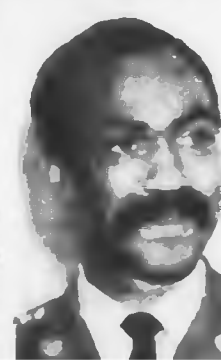
From Raleigh's Official Police Files
