WASHINGTON - In the newest language yet used by a black college president on the matter of police slayings of unarmed students on black college campuses, Dr. James E. Cheek, president of Howard University, early last week blasted the existence of an all-white board of education for a predominantly black institution.

Cheek called for an emergency meeting of black college presidents to discuss the murders of two unarmed students by law enforcement officers last week at Southern University in Baton Rouge, La. He said in a 16-page statement of his thoughts and reaction to the student slayings that he noted with "disbelief and bewilderment" the fact that black colleges in Louisiana are administered by an all-white board of education that also has responsibility for the state's public school system.

No educator involved in black higher education can stand idle in the face of such circumstances for one reason: in circumstance such as these the ingredients for that kind of student unrest and protest that lead easily to confrontation and ultimately to tragedy, said Cheek.

## Attempts To Get Kids To Speak "White" Blasted

AUSTIN, Texas - The attempt to require black children to learn the "middle-class white language" in order to achieve upward mobility is a repugnant and dead movement, a University of Texas professor said last Wednesday.

Speaking to the Language Research Seminar at UT Austin, English Prof. James H. Sledd said the concept, known as "bilingualism" is both immoral and impossible.

Bilingualism "sets up white prejudice as an immovable obstacle to black advancement and requires black children to remake themselves in a white image if they are to move themselves upward," Dr. Sledd said.
