Another Sports Great Struck Out By Death

CHICAGO - Wendell Smith, nationally known sports writer and sports caster, who went to bat many times, both in his column and on his news hour, was called out by the umpire of the universe, when his cancer-ravaged body was not able to swing at the last strike, Sunday, at the St. Joseph Hospital, which he had been in and out of for the past six months.

Even though Wendell reached his peak as a sports writer with the Pittsburgh Courier in the 1930s, he learned the hard way the life of a black baseball player. He knew of the unpleasant travels of black stars and the living conditions that they were subjected to. He was coming in when the American Giants, the Bacharach Giants, the Havana Red Sox were going out but had the benefit of hearing the veterans tell their stories.

He came in when the Kansas City Monarchs, Birmingham Black Barons, Baltimore Black Sox, the Homestead Grays, the Cuban Stars and some other teams were playing one night games in double headers on

FINDS \$8,000 IN FORMER BROTHEL - Charlottesville, Va. - When robbers smashed into the old Marguerita mansion, which was used as a brothel until it was closed down in 1949, they unearthed thousands of dollars in cash. Several hundred men, women and children have been combing the remains for some of the treasure, in bills, some as big as \$1,000, and coins. No one knows exactly how much money has been found, but Darlene Harris says she found \$8,000 worth and poses with her find. Most recently Marguerita's was used as a rest home for about 15 elderly people. Marguerita died in 1951. (UPI)
