Nationwide Program Will Recruit, Train

Applications are being sought in the Raleigh area by the National Urban Fellows, a nationwide program designed to recruit and train urban administrators and to open top leadership opportunities in government for minority group members and women. Persons now applying will be candidates for the fifth Fellowship year which begins on July 1, 1973 and ends on June 30, 1974.

The program is sponsored by the National League of Cities, the United States Conference of Mayors and Yale University. It is supported by funds from the Ford Foundation and the cities to which Fellows are assigned, and is directed by Frank Logue of New Haven, Connecticut. The National Urban Fellows are men and women in their twenties and thirties, mainly from ethnic minorities, who are selected competitively on the basis of their leadership potential. During the first four years of the program, Fellowships were awarded to 115 men and women, primarily blacks, Mexican-Americans and Puerto Ricans. Graduate Fellows are now employed in key positions in city, county and state government throughout the country.

The core of the Fellowship program is a ten-month on-the-job assignment as special assistant to a mayor, city manager or other urban administrator. In past years, Fellows have worked closely with Mayors Wes Uhlman of Seattle, Sam Massell of Atlanta, Kenneth Gibson of Newark and Richard Lugar of Indianapolis. C. B. Jones Stabbed In Chest Here

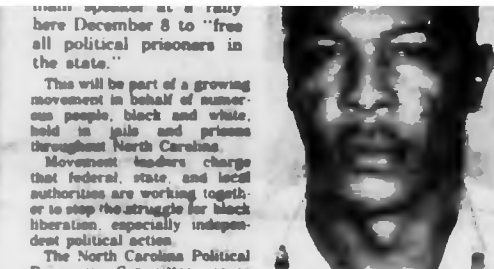
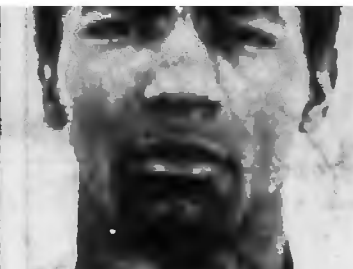
Will "Free Political Prisoners"

Miss Davis Will Address Many Rallies

CHARLOTTE — Angela Davis will be the main speaker at a rally here December 8 to "free all political prisoners in the state." This will be part of a growing movement in behalf of numerous people, black and white, held in jails and prisons throughout North Carolina. Movement leaders charge that federal, state and local authorities are working together to stop the struggle for black liberation, especially independent political action. The North Carolina Political Prisoners Committee says: "The state is conducting a systematic campaign to jail every black leader. They are using the tactics of fabricating criminal charges and purchasing witnesses. The freedom rally will open at 7:30 p.m. in Park Center, 310 N. King's Road. Other speakers will include Ms. Elizabeth Chavis of Oxford, N.C., mother of the Rev. Ben Chavis, one of the prisoners. Chavis is an organizer for the Commission for Racial Justice, a branch of the United Church of Christ. (See PROGRESS, P. 2)

Justice Department Criticized For Not Enforcing Voter Laws

WASHINGTON — Attorney General Richard G. Kleindienst, head of the Justice Department, which is largely responsible for enforcing the laws of the land, is coming under fire because of his actions relating to the enforcement of voting laws. Civil rights groups contend that he has not used his power under the Voting Rights Act of 1965 and 1970 to ensure that blacks in the South are not denied the right to vote. They charge that his actions are leading to the disenfranchisement of large numbers of southern blacks. Last week, District Court Judge John H. Pratt requested the Attorney General to come forward with a "reasoned decision" for his failure to exercise his full powers under the voting rights acts to stop Canton, Mississippi from changing election procedures to the detriment of black voters. Robert Brown Leaves DC; Comes Back In High Point

WASHINGTON — The highest ranking black in the Nixon Administration has resigned to rejoin his public relations firm in North Carolina, while the President has committed his Administration to at least doubling the number of blacks in key posts. Robert J. Brown, special assistant to the President during the past four years, was praised highly by the President at a closed-door meeting with 37 top ranking officials — all Black last week. Accepting Brown's resignation with "special regret," the President told the appointees that he would immediately seek to at least double the number of Black officials in high and middle-level government posts. He said he would also move to immediately appoint several black ambassadors and put blacks in positions across the board throughout the federal government. He did not, however, discuss the possible appointment of a black to the Cabinet. It has been rumored for some time that Assistant HUD Secretary Samuel Jackson is in line to...
