This will be an exceptional opportunity for students to combine a different kind of vacation with study.

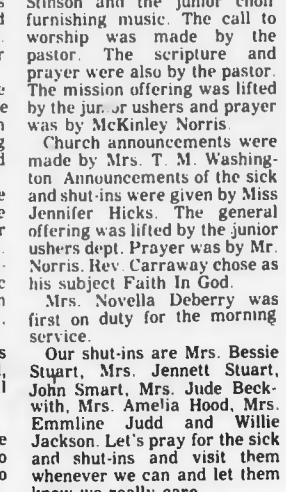

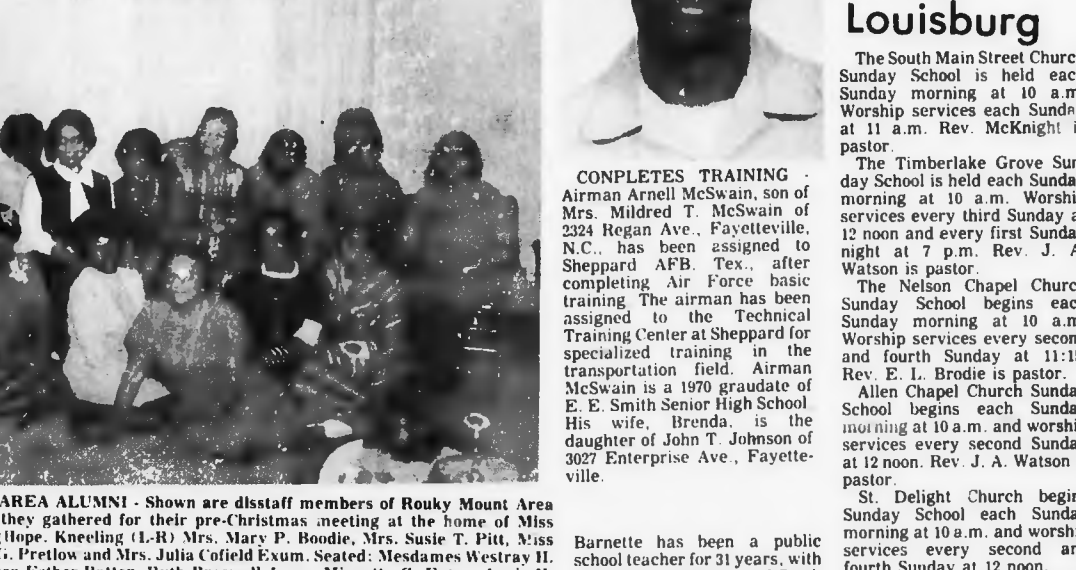
