### Claims Additive Prevents Poisoning

NEW YORK - The New York University Medical Center has announced the discovery of a "lead inactivator" which it claims may prevent lead poisoning in young children.

The inactivator is an additive for ordinary interior latex paint which, it is claimed, would neutralize the ill effects of ingestion of flakes of old lead-based paint from crumbling tenement walls.

The research was underwritten by the Grow Chemical Corporation of New York.

Dr. Jack Owen Reed, director of the research project for the University's Laboratory for Experimental Medicine and

### Surgery in Primates, said:

"The results of our latest series of animal tests offer conclusive evidence that protective value has been demonstrated. The test results show that the histological examination of kidney tissue from rats fed daily with paint pigments containing high lead content, combined with the lead inacti-

### vator prevents the nephrotoxic (kidney-damaging) effects of lead."

Dr. Reed said other tests involving young baboons, a primate closer in its biochemical relationship to human infants, had shown that the inactivator chemical caused no adverse effects of its own when administered by mouth.

## Dropouts Responding To GI Bill Entitlement

Free GI Bill entitlement for high school dropouts and marginal graduates is bringing more "educationally disadvantaged" back to classrooms, a Veterans Administration report reveals.

The 125,000 figure includes 70,000 veterans and servicemen who completed up to 11 years of schooling, and 55,000 high school graduates who lacked prerequisites for higher education.

While 125,000 educationally disadvantaged persons trained under free entitlement, another 282,000 trainees who failed to complete high school used VA education benefits to attend vocational and trade schools, or take correspondence courses and on-job training.

GI Bill allowances for educationally disadvantaged trainees and college students are the same. The rate is \$220 per month for single full-time trainees, with proportionately higher rates for trainees with dependents. However, free entitlement training is not charged against education benefits earned in military service.

The Veterans Administration recently opened its first specialized hospital unit for stroke victims and the agency is conducting an intensive medical research attack on strokes, heart disease, cancer, and emphysema.

Administrator of Veterans Affairs Donald E. Johnson disclosed recently that more than 20,000 veterans were drawing "unearned" GI educational benefits by attending high school and college preparatory courses.

Veterans who have completed a tour of military service normally earn enough GI Bill entitlement to complete four years of college. Johnson explained. Those who need extra work to qualify for college can receive extra months of GI Bill allowances while taking the preparatory work and still have four years of educational benefits remaining for college, he said.

Enrollment in such courses in November - normally the peak month - was up 36 percent over the 1971 mark to a total of 21,300. A total of 125,000 have used the program since it was authorized in 1967.
