

The percentage of blacks these positions are extremely high, giving an untrue out almost tolerable perspective to the percentage of total state employed blacks. Creed stated that in truth, the number of blacks in the 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., five-week with moderate to high salary positions, is pathetically low. The blacks in executive, supervisory, tore man and administrative type positions, are about as rare as a white man trying to pass as black. Dr. Creed further stated, that when various agencies are questioned about their low to non-existant number of black employees, we get the usual answer. We didn't get applications from qualified blacks.

They claim to actively recruit blacks, but can't seem to find then. Certainly with the hundreds of students graduating from our many predominantly black colleges and universities, right here in North Carolina, they shouldn't have to look too hard. 
