Black Leaders Want Funding By SBA

WASHINGTON - A group of black leaders, on the heels of the House small business subcommittee to table a request to raise the Small Business Administration's loan-making authority, has asked Congress to quickly approve the funding bill. funding authority, said that the SBA request for an increase in its loan authority by \$2.3 billion to a ceiling of \$6.6 billion, should be granted. T. Bradley Urges Gas Rationing

National Black News Service LOS ANGELES, Calif. - Mayor Tom Bradley of this automobile dependent city, opposes a ban on Sunday driving of the closing of service stations. The answer to the energy shortage, he says, is gas rationing.

To limit car use on Sundays as proposed by President Nixon, would only punish the wrong people, Bradley says. "This is merely a cosmetic approach to the problem. Those who must attend it would just buy their gas on Saturdays."

Bradley called on Nixon and the Congress to push for year round daylight saving time to increase federal funding for road transit, to adopt an excise profits tax for energy producers and to develop new energy sources.

"The nation's companies made huge profits last year - 39 percent. And the public can't be asked to make an oil sacrifice."

A tax should be levied to development of new and clean energy sources to increase energy supplies. We are entitled to more control on the production and distribution of energy to insure that fairness will prevail. No unfair profit must be made on the suffering and mismanagement of an oil, he said.

Bradley is urging Los Angeles area residents to obey a 10-mile-per-hour speed limit, eliminate car air conditioners, use car pools, combine shopping, walking and bicycling. He also asks business and private cars to observe possible Los Angeles streets and freeways accommodate more than 5 million cars daily.

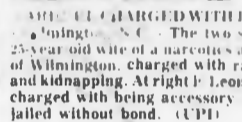

RJR Representative Is Breakfast Orator

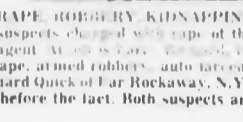

Mystery Shrouds Murder

RICH SQUARE - Mystery still shrouds the unusual circumstances surrounding the death and burial of a black woman, whose age could range anywhere between 20 and 40, according to police authorities in Northampton County, who are still investigating the case. The only identifying items found in the shallow grave were two earrings and a gold ring.

The victim had been shot in the head one time, officials claimed Sunday night. Charles Dunn, director of the State Bureau of Investigation, reported that the woman's grave was so shallow that it was discovered by hunters, who were walking through a wooded area, five miles south of this city.

The gravesite was near U.S. 258 in Northampton County. According to Dunn, the ring carried the initials H.G.E. and (See WOMAN IN, P. 2)
