Tarboro Area Blacks To Seek Many Seats

TARBORO - Some 45 black citizens, representing the East Tarboro Citizens League and the Edgecombe County Progressive Association, with Dentist Moses A. Ray as president of both political groups, met Sunday afternoon in Union Baptist Church here, in an attempt to "unioize" the political strategy of Edgecombe's black citizens in an all-out effort to elect more than one member of their race to office on the county and district level this year.

Chairman Ray had invited those considered "community leaders" to form a nucleus of workers to "beat the bushes" in a "closed meeting" to consider possible candidates for public offices.

After several comments from citizens regarding solidarity of effort, and a perusal of the last countywide registration-voting record of both races, it was learned that countywide, 12,212 whites registered as against 6,533 blacks. Of that number registered, 9,427 whites voted.

Elimination Of Lunches Is Defended

BY LOUISE E. WYCHE National Black News Service WASHINGTON - A top Administration official has defended his recommendation that the bulk food purchasing program for the school lunch program be eliminated, claiming without documentation or projections that it would save taxpayers money.

Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Clayton Yeutter, in a letter to Agriculture Secretary Earl Butz, suggested "a gradual phase down (and hopefully phase out)" of the agency's food purchase programs by the end of fiscal year 1975.

He said the government "can provide an equivalent amount of assistance with a cash program that is now provided with a commodity program. And we should be able to provide it with considerably less money."

Along with the school lunch program, the bulk food purchasing program includes food

Urban League's Vernon Jordan Calls For Sweeping Health Aid

NEW YORK, N. Y. - Vernon E. Jordan, Jr., executive Director of the National Urban League, last Friday outlined a National Health Program whose goal is "to insure that each and every person, regardless of race, or income or geographic location, has high quality, comprehensive, dignified medical, dental and mental health care."

He branded the Administration's health proposal, unveiled by President Nixon in the State of the Union message, "inadequate because its primary concern is to protect the profits of the health industry rather than to protect the health and lives of the people."

Defendant's Help Asked In Killing

Prosecutors asked D.C. Superior Court Judge Leonard Braman to drop charges against James H. Price, 23, so he could testify against five other men charged with murdering seven Hanafi Moslems at the sect's home here Jan. 18, 1973.

Price would not be charged as a co-defendant in the current trials, if the motion is granted, but he could be tried later under a 23-count indictment. (See DEFENDANT'S, P. 2)

US Agency Surrenders, Says Wilkins

NEW YORK - Continued neglect of the housing needs of low and middle income families in the urban centers, may well lead to the "collapse" of the nation, Roy Wilkins, executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, warned in an address delivered at a luncheon meeting of the United Mortgage Bankers of America, at the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, here last week.

The nation, Mr. Wilkins said, "will collapse without a government policy on building for the great bulk of the population." If the nation faces such a collapse, "inflation or lack of peace or high crimes and misdemeanors in government, will not matter. We will be dead as surely as if we had been shot in the head. And it will be worse than being really dead, because we will be walking and talking, but will be without direction or goals. Our society will be without the great employment that housing brings. All of the peripheral activities, such as the United Mortgage Bankers, would either cease or be seriously damaged."

Assembly Told To Up Aid

RICHMOND - The Virginia Assembly has heard a proposed plea from recipients of the state's welfare program that they increase the funding level of the program. The legislators, who are considering a welfare reform package, have received a report from the Virginia Advisory Legislative Council that has called for a streamlining of the welfare system and for giving mothers who receive aid 100 per cent of the amount they need for minimum subsistence as local welfare agencies do. Rejected Officer In Top Post

WASHINGTON - The black military officer who was blocked from taking a post in Chile because of his race late last year has been named to head the office that helps select military advisers.

Defense Secretary James R. Schlesinger has let the word out that any officers found discriminating racially will be denied promotions. Schlesinger has been rather upset that a report on the affair involving Col. Travis M. Gafford's appointment as a military adviser in Chile has not been completed by the Pentagon yet.

He recently told one officer responsible for the delay angrily, "Don't think if you keep postponing this that I'll forget it." He was scheduled to receive the report on the incident a number of months ago.

The military has failed to issue the report thus far. When the rejection of Col. (See OFFICER IN, P. 2)
