Congresswoman Shirley Chisholm has been practically cleared of charges that she and her campaign for President committee mishandled funds. The allegation, which was made in a 10-page report by the General Accounting Office an arm of the Congress-said there were "apparent violations" of federal election and corporate regulations.
