License Tape Is Okayed

In a case which involved both a Smithfield man and a Durham resident, both blacks, the United States Supreme Court ruled last week that First Amendment rights to the Constitution were being violated by states which require people to put on license plates which carry solgans that they do not want to display on their automobile tags. North Carolina's slogal is "First In Freedom." Both men taped over the slogans on their cars. The Supreme Court test case involved a Jehovah Witness couple from Claremont, N. H., who claimed they were forced to carry the slogan, "Live Free Or Die" on their car.

By a vote of 7 to 2, the justices supported the claims of George and Maxine Maynard, who said they found the slogan "Morally, ethically, religiously and politically abhorrent." The Maynards said it would be contrary to their religion to give up their lives for the state," even if it meant living in bondage."

Maynard was arrested threatimes, two years ago, fined \$75 and finally placed in jail for 15 days after he placed adhesive tape over the slogan on his Toyota and Plymouth station vagons.

In its ruling, the court stated: "The state may not constitutionally require an individual to participate in the
