WASHINGTON, D. C. — The jobless rate for blacks, which ends to fluctuate much more from month to month than the rate for whites, edged up from 13.1 to 13.9 percent in October, the U. S. Labor Department's Bureau of Labor Statistics reported.

Unemployment of white workers, on the other hand, has held at 6.1 percent for 4 straight months.

Over the past year, the black rate has shown no improvement, while joblessness for while joblessness to while shadedled by more than a percentage point.
