## Blacks Protest Stand

GREENSBORO — The N. C. Alumni and Friends Coalition assembled approximately 75 black citizens in a two-day retreat last Saturday and Sunday in Greensboro to do an in-depth analysis and critique of the desegregation plans submitted to HEW by the University of North Carolina and the Community College System. Among those participating in that meeting were black chancellors, legislators, students, members of the Board of Governors, faculty, staff and trustees of the traditionally black institutions of higher education, their alumni representatives and friends, as well as officials from the State Advisory Committee for (See PROTEST, P. 2)

## Ruling Is Rapped By Mitchell

National Black News Service WASHINGTON, D. C. — Congressman Parren J. Mitchell (D-Md.), chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus, has labeled the Oct. 31, 1977 ruling by the U. S. District Court in Los Angeles, Calif., against the minority provisions of the Public Works Employment Act of 1977 "expected" and "a matter that will probably finally be decided by the Supreme Court." Mitchell stressed, however, that he is "fully confident and has been repeatedly assured that, in the interim, the program will proceed full steam ahead with the original Congressional intent of assisting minority businesses." ## Escapes Still Sought

Two young women prisoners, who reportedly climbed a ten-foot fence at the N. C. Correctional Center for Women Sunday and escaped, are still being sought, according to officials of the facility. The women were identified as Misses Patricia Cole, 24, who is serving 10 to 15 for voluntary manslaughter, and Barbara Eaton, 26, who is serving 20 years for assault and armed robbery. Officials at the prison, located on Bragg Street, said the escape took place about 6:45 p.m. and was made from the east side of the prison.

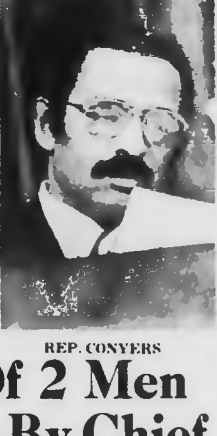
Highway Collision Is Fatal

DUNN — Funeral rites for Miss Lina Culbreth, retired school teacher and Christian educator, killed in a traffic accident at 8:30 a.m. Wednesday, Nov. 9, were held at Trinity AME Zion Church Tuesday afternoon.

She was attending the 97th session of the Central N.C. Conference, AME Zion Church and was making her way to Freedom Chapel Church, where the conference was being held. Motorists who arrived on the scene immediately after the impact are said to have related that she was approaching the intersection of 201 and 401 bypasses, about a mile from the church, when her car was hit by a highway marker truck, traveling at a high rate of speed. The truck is said to have turned her car completely around, striking it on the driver's side. She was pinned in the car and is believed to have died instantly. She is said to have been grasping a Bible when she died. Bishop W. A. Hilliard presided over the rites. The eulogy was delivered by the pastor of Trinity Church. Music was furnished by one of the choirs. (See EX-TEACHER, P. 2)

## Slaying Of 2 Men Defended By Chief

Funeral services were conducted Monday for Ricky Hinton, 26, 119 E. Garner Loop Road, who was one of two men killed early Thursday of last week in the robbery of the Holiday Inn on U. S. Highway 1, North, in Raleigh. The services were held at noon at the First Cosmopolitan Baptist Church and burial followed in the National Cemetery with full military honors. Hinton was unarmed.

Hinton and Rush Higgins, 24, were gunned down as they attempted to escape the scene of a robbery at the Holiday Inn about 1:10 a.m. Thursday. According to officers, both refused orders to halt and Higgins allegedly pointed a gun at officers.

Police chief Robert E. Goodwin said he believed the slayings were a case of self-defense.

## Thorpe To Speak At NC Museum

PITTSBORO — Noted historian Earlie E. Thorpe will be guest speaker in Pittsboro at the Black History Museum's culminating program of its initial drive for funds. The museum, opening for a special showing at 1 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 27 will feature a salute to the black press and a tribute to black businesses of North Carolina.

Books authored by Dr. Thorpe, who will speak at a 3 o'clock program on Sunday, Nov. 27, include: The Central Theme of Black History, Black Historians: A Critique, The Old South: A Psycho-history, and Eros and Freedom in Southern Life and Thought.

With the theme "Before the Mayflower" there will be a black history dramatization and a reenactment of the first Thanksgiving with dinner and bonfire. All Sunday events will take place on the Chatham County fairgrounds, off Hwy. 64 just east of Pittsboro.

On Saturday evening, Nov. 26, in the Horton Middle School Gym in Pittsboro, the 24th Miss Piedmont Beauty Pageant will be staged. Popular emcee Milton Grady will be master of (See NC MUSEUM, P. 10)

## Shaw U. To Host Meeting

On Thursday, Dec. 1 and Friday, Dec. 2, a conference on "Blacks and the Criminal Justice System" will be held at Shaw University in Raleigh. Congressman John Conyers, Jr. (D-Mich.) will keynote the conference on Dec. 1.

Congressman Conyers is a member of the House Judiciary Committee and chairs its Subcommittee on Crime. He is also a member of the Congressional Black Caucus and chairs its Criminal Justice Braintrust. Conyers has been one of the lone voices in the U.S. Congress seeking freedom for the Wilmington 10.

Reginald Eaves, commissioner of Public Safety in Atlanta, Ga., will speak at the dinner on Thursday, Dec. 1. Commissioner Eaves is the first black appointed as commissioner. He has been a forerunner in eliminating racist attitudes and elements in the fire and police departments in Atlanta.

This 2-day conference will hold workshops on Juvenile Justice, Penal Reform, Special Problems of Women, Prisoners' Rights, Community-Police Relations, Employment, Education and Training and the Legal System and the Poor. The object of these workshops is to develop goals and standards for the N.C. Criminal Justice System.

On Friday, Dec. 2, the National Minority Advisory Council of the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA), under the U.S. Dept. of Justice, will conduct public hearings as a part of its report to be submitted to LEAA. The public is invited to participate.

Among the North Carolinians scheduled to be in attendance are Secretary Amos Reed, Dept. of Corrections, and Bert Montague, executive director of the Administrative Office of the Court.

## Funeral Held For Husband

The condition of Betty Champion was the target of several pistol wounds, fired by her husband here Friday afternoon. She was listed as "good" by medical officials at Wake Medical Center Tuesday afternoon. The woman later died, and was given a funeral in Raleigh Wednesday of this week.

Jesse I. Champion, 35, Fox Hill Circle, took his own life after going on a rampage and shooting and killing his brother-in-law, who is a Wake County deputy sheriff. The incident took place on Dacian Road. Deputy Calvin K. reported that his sister had been shot three times in the chest. Her estranged husband, when he went to the hospital, was reported to have been beating her and she was screaming.
