Evening Courses At JTI

SMITHFIELD—Courses in the Commercial Art program will be offered by Johnston Technical Institute in the evening hours. In addition to the full daytime curriculum, photography and drawing courses will be available to part-time students this winter. Photography I will be taught on Monday and Wednesday nights from 6:30 to 10 p.m. Mike Williams will be the instructor. Life Drawing I is offered on Tuesday and Thursday nights, from 6:30 to 8:45 p.m., and will be taught by Mrs. Carol Boviall.

Photography II is offered for those who have completed the first course in photography. The instructor will be Perry Bryant. Classes will be held on Tuesday and Thursday nights from 6:30 to 9:10 p.m. Mr. Bryant has taught art in Johnston County for several years.

Registration for these classes will be on Nov. 29, 1978. Tuition is \$3.25 per credit hour. Photography I earns 4 credit hours and the others are 3 hours each. Individuals may enroll in these courses as Special Students. Credits earned can later be applied toward an associate degree, if desired. Additional information may be obtained from the Admissions Office, at Johnston Technical Institute, in Smithfield.

The Institute will also offer beginning typing and Office Machines and Payroll Accounting courses through the Special Student program. These classes are regular curriculum on-campus courses.

The beginning typing course will meet on Tuesday evenings. Office Machines and Payroll Accounting classes will also meet on Tuesdays at 7 p.m. The first class meetings are scheduled for Dec. 5, 1978. The Special Student program allows persons to enroll in regular curriculum courses without the full admissions process required of regular degree-seeking students. These credits can later be applied toward associate degree programs if desired.

Persons who are at least 18 years old and high school graduates and who are interested in taking either of these courses should contact the Johnston Technical Institute Student Affairs Office at 934-3051.

Graduate legislative intern selections are based on written skills, sociogeographic factors and recommendations from the deans of the respective graduate schools.

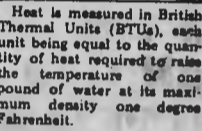

More DUI Arrests In '78 Than Ever Before

If the present trend continues, state troopers will arrest more drunken drivers in 1978 than ever before. State Highway Commander John T. Jenkins reported recently.

During the first nine months of 1978, the Highway Patrol charged 31,919 motorists with driving under the influence (DUI), 15.6 percent more than during the same period last year.

The 1978 total is fast approaching the record set in 1972 when troopers arrested 41,241 alcohol-influenced drivers, Jenkins said. At the end of September, the Patrol had charged 366 more motorists with DUI than for the same period in 1972, leading Jenkins to predict the new record for 1978.

Do the additional DUI charges indicate an increase in the number of drinking drivers on the highways? "I doubt this is

the case," Jenkins said. "It is more likely," he continued, "that the increase in DUI charges illustrates the fact that the more troopers 'safer' are on the highways, the safer the highways will be."

In an effort to reduce alcohol-related fatal accidents, the Patrol instituted an overtime program in May, 1978. Funded by the Governor's Highway Safety Office, the program places in action an additional 355 highway patrolmen each week who volunteer to work overtime for additional pay. Substantial increases in DUI charges have been experienced each month since the program began.

"Making a record number of DUI charges is not a concern of the Patrol," Jenkins commented, "but removing every drunken driver we possibly can from our streets and highways

is an integral part of our total traffic safety program."
