# Rep. Hawkins Impressed By Effective School Measure

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Congressman Augustus F. "Gus" Hawkins (D-Calif.), author of H.R. 4731, the Effective Schools Development in Education Act, said he is "encouraged by the initial support of a legislative measure which attempts to advance the cause of education for our children."

Introduced on Feb. 4, the purpose of the bill is to provide assistance to local and state education agencies in expanding and improving their effective schools program by providing matching federal grants for such programs.

Aimed at improving student academic achievements, student behavior, and teaching and learning practices, five characteristics of effective schools are identified as: strong administrative leadership; a safe and orderly school atmosphere; high expectations for student achievement; strong emphasis on the acquisition of basic academic skills; and regular student performance evaluations.

# Sickle Cell Symposium Presented

WASHINGTON, C.C. — Three members of the Howard University College of Medicine participated as speakers at a sickle cell anemia symposium held at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine in Baltimore, Md. Dr. Roland B. Scott, director of the Howard University Center for Sickle Cell Disease, discussed "the Clinical Diagnosis and Management of Patients with Sickle Cell Anemia." Dr. Robert F. Murray, Jr., professor of pediatrics and medicine and director of the genetics program at the Howard University College of Medicine, was the leader of a workshop on "Genetic Counseling."

Although we have heard an excessive amount of rhetoric with respect to excellence in education, there has not been a substantive effort to provide a meaningful vehicle supporting new ideas in education," added Hawkins.

"We should not give up on our children's potential by hiding behind the myth that economic and social position is a permanent barrier to a child's academic success. Schools can make a difference if certain administrative and teaching characteristics are set into motion," concluded Hawkins.

Field hearings are tentatively planned later this year on the legislation. H.R. 4731 currently has 60 congressional cosponsors.

 abnormal sickle cell hemoglobin) were treated with Hydergine daily to test whether this would reduce the number of sickle cell crises. One child who, observed over two years, would have been expected (on the basis of his recent medical history) to suffer 48 attacks in this time, actually had only four attacks. A homozygote adult, who would have been expected to have 60 attacks in a 15-month period, had only four. The study's heterozygote children and adults (who have one gene for the abnormal hemoglobin and one for the normal variety) would have had one to eight crises during their periods of observation and almost all had no crises with Hydergine.  
 Hopefully, this debate will lead to an effective therapy for the thousands of African-Americans who suffer from this painful disease.
