Summer Travel Tips

According to the U.S. Travel Data Center, vacation travel this season will be up almost three percent over last summer, a record-breaking season for American travelers. If you're joining the crowd, here are some helpful tips on easing the traumas of travel and getting full enjoyment from your trip:

- If you travel by airplane, the quickest way to get on board is to make round trip seating arrangements when you reserve, buy your tickets ahead of time (either by mail or at a ticket office), and carry on your bags. This means you can breeze straight through to your boarding gate when you arrive at the airport, not waiting in line to check in.
- When you reserve at your destination hotel, be sure to get guaranteed late-arrival reservations so you're sure of a place to stay even if your plane is delayed.
- Definitely carry on board — rather than checking — documents and cash, plus travelers' checks, tickets, credit cards, confirmations of hotel reservations, and rental car contracts, anything important to your itinerary. Valuables, like jewelry and cameras, are also best taken on board with you, and your personal essentials (definitely medications, but also a toothbrush, clean underwear, shaving equipment, etc.) packed into a carry-on bag will be heaven-sent if your checked luggage is delayed or misplaced.

DEAR DR. EVERS

Dear Dr. Evers: My son has just made the final cut on his junior high's football team. I'm worried, however, that his health and general well being are being endangered. Do you agree? — F.S.

Dear F.S.: Football is a high-speed contact sport, and with that you'll have to expect some injuries. It is estimated that nearly 50 percent of the three million people who play football each year will receive some sort of injury. However, the majority of these fall in the minor range, from sprains to bruises.

It is now law that facemasks and helmets be worn, and this has been effective legislation to reduce injuries. Unfortunately, the players have realized their helmets can be used as a battle weapon, thus putting the cervical spine at risk. Be sure you instill in your son the importance of NOT doing this. Although these neck injuries are uncommon, their potential severity makes their prevention by strict adherence to the rules extremely important.

Other more serious injuries are characteristic of football players, but since your son is playing with other 11 to 13 year olds, let's hope dislocated knees and separated shoulders will be of no concern.

YOU & YOUR CHILD

Throughout school years, parents should look to their children's other learning partners, their teachers, for guidance when specific questions arise. Teachers welcome opportunities to consult with their parent partners and encourage them to become involved in their children's schooling. Below, what can be done to foster this relationship:

- Attend school events to become acquainted with the principal, teachers and staff and to express your interest — both to the school and your child — in your child's success.
- If your child has problems with homework or other schoolwork, discuss them privately with the teacher, or together with the teacher and child, to identify causes and determine solutions.
- When your child has difficulty with a specific assignment, urge her to consult with the teacher in the morning before school begins to ask for clarification. The child may then have some time to work on what she didn't understand before class meets again.
- If your child has trouble completing a project exactly as assigned, encourage her to negotiate some changes so that the final project can still hold interest for the child while meeting the teacher's learning objectives.
- When an older class seldom or never has homework in a particular subject, the parent should call the teacher to discuss why.
- In short, both parent and child should foster an open attitude toward their teaching partners and seek their help immediately whenever trouble arises with homework or material presented in school. Successes, too, should be shared with teachers — these are the rewards of their work and their measure of the child's progress.
- In short, work together within your child's learning partnership — with everyone involved — to find the ways to make schoolwork organized, meaningful and
