FOCUS ON SENIORS

Exercise Machines

Regular exercise is vital at any age, but the thought of working out at a health club may seem intimidating. Forget your fears, says Modern Maturity magazine.

"Today's slick new exercise equipment offers new opportunities to improve physical fitness, mobility and mental alertness," notes Diane Eicher. Eicher offers an overview of what you'll find in a gym and the pluses/minuses of each machine.

Not every exercise machine is suited to or safe for those over 50, so first check with a doctor to gauge your proper "exercise prescription," Eicher notes. And get competent instruction. Choices include:

- Stationary bicycles. These are good for cardiovascular fitness and require little training. A button or knob adjusts wheel resistance.

- Cross-country ski machines imitate the motion of skiing for a low-impact all around workout. Good balance and motor control are needed.

- Weight-lifting machines improve upper and lower body strength, and can be adjusted to limit the range of motion, particularly important for elderly users with arthritis or other joint problems.

Those with access to a club/recreation center "should use as many machines as possible," Eicher says.

acts," as he responded to the Los Angeles policemen's behavior, didn't you wonder how he saw their behavior as sick acts when he ordered the bombing of land in Kuwait in order to stop the "murderous acts" of Saddam Hussein? Didn't you wonder how the News and Observer could suggest that Rev. Al Sharpton was an "outside agitator" or "civil rights opportunist" and wonder that our involvement in the Persian Gulf was not "outside agitation" or "perceived civil rights opportunism?" Isn't it interesting that President Bush could on the one hand state that the high ratio of African-Americans in the Persian Gulf was "an example of equal opportunity"—to die—while this same president vetoed the Civil Rights Act of 1990? Doesn't the behavior negate the words?

For all of the above reasons, it is interesting that there are those who would proclaim the merits of capital punishment while being repulsed at having it witnessed by the people who are said to be "the state that is acting." It is my belief that there is something healthy about being repulsed by that which is wrong. Paradoxically, there is something unhealthy about believing that something is right but not wanting to view it. We are living in times when the most same method of staying sane is to become grounded firmly in some decision as to what is clearly wrong and what is clearly right. What seems simple to me is the Golden Rule, which resounds in every religion. If we would that something not be done to us—let's not do it to another. If we would be confronted on our wrongs so we can begin to move toward doing what is right then let us begin to do the necessary confronting. If we would not take that which we cannot give back, then let us begin to see that human life is that which is not to be taken. If we would live in the light of truth, then let us be truth-seekers with the firm conviction that if truth exists then seeking shall result in its finding. If it is worthy of finding and we seek it, surely we will meet our brother there.
