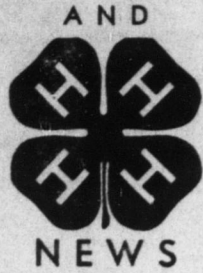


DEMONSTRATION DOINGS IN DARE

Daniel Benjamin Garrish, age 76, native of Ocracoke Island, died on May 20 at the Veteran's Hospital, Kecoughtan, Va., following a long illness. Funeral services were held at the Ocracoke Methodist Church on Monday morning at ten thirty, with Rev. W. R. Hale officiating. Interment was in the Community cemetery. Except for service in the U. S. Navy from 1899 to 1903, Mr. Garrish spent his entire life at Ocracoke. He was married August 19, 1903 to Annie Lee Scarborough, who survives him. Surviving children are Mrs. Howard O'Neal of Ocracoke and Mrs. Graydon Ring of High Point, three grandchildren and two great-grandchildren. 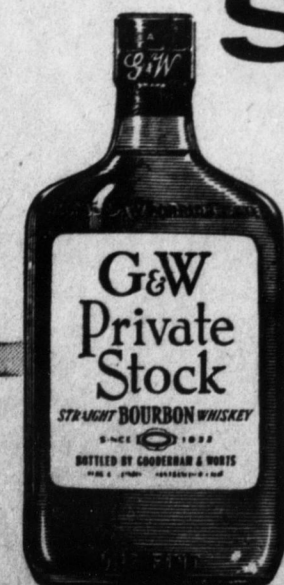
