There's never any knowing what will turn up on the beach after a storm and in keeping with ancient custom on Hatteras Island, the villagers go searching when the sea calms down. Last week, after Ione, Ralph Scarborough, of Kinnakeet, set out to see what he could see and discovered the surprise of his and a good many of his neighbor's life—a nine-inch creosoted pile

Times were when sea-faring men came home with the planking of their schooners impaled by a swordfish, sometimes even three-inch planks being penetrated, and there is legend on the Outer Banks of one ship that came home with nine swords in it—and each time the skipper thought he had had a collision with something. But that one of these critters could penetrate nine inches of solid timber is something else. Nobody could quite believe it, but there it was.

Swordfish are sometimes taken off Cape Hatteras but usually people avoid them. They can get to weigh as much as 1,000 pounds and old seamen say they can swim at a rate of 100 miles an hour.
