FEW LOCAL RACES: LIGHT VOTE SEEN SATURDAY PRIMARY

Governor Hodges and Ervin Seen All Out in Front, County Candidates Few

There are few local races in the counties, and a comparatively light vote is expected to turn out in Saturday's primary election this week, May 26. On the state ticket, Governor Luther H. Hodges is expected to stand way out ahead of all four of his opponents, one of whom is Harry Stokely, formerly of Elizabeth City, but now with the other two contenders against Hodges, living in the Charlotte area. These three candidates have made comparatively no impression in this campaign.

The two other candidates for Governor not named above are C. E. Earle Jr. and Tom Sawyer.

There are five candidates for leading one in this area appears to be Alonzo Edwards of Hookerton in Greene County. The four others are Kidd Brewer of Raleigh, J. V. Whitfield of Burgaw, Gurney P. Hood of Raleigh and Luther E. Barnhardt of Concord.

Commissioner of Agriculture L. Y. Ballentine is opposed by Kermit U. Gray of Winston-Salem. Frank Crane, Commissioner of Labor, is opposed by James R. Farlow and H. D. Lambeth Jr.
