Quickly rolling up five first downs after the kick off, the Red Skins were finally stopped by Central on their five yard line. In the second quarter Coy Tillett Jr. intercepted a Central pass and raced 65-yard for a touchdown. Randie Houstin added the extra point, but these seven points were the only scoring done by Manteo. A few plays later Coy Tillett, the Red Skin's first string quarterback and ace passer was injured and taken out of the game. This slowed down Manteo's attack somewhat. Even though he tried






