Possibility of the purchase of the electric power system on Roanoke Island by Virginia Electric & Power Company appeared this week when Vepco Vice-President Ray Goodmon of Williamston, appeared before the Manteo Town Board in the interest of a franchise for his company. The Roanoke Utilities franchise expires in about two years.

The property is now owned by the Roanoke Utilities Co., consisting of members of the Fearing family, who have operated the business about 30 years. It was begun by Dr. F. P.
