In relying upon figures from other towns, as a basis for estimating probable profits from a proposed electric light system to serve the town of Manteo, the per cent monthly. Residential rates larger town of Belhaven, which buys current from VEPCO and distributes it to consumers, has been used as a yardstick. Until three years ago, Belhaven generated current with a costly diesel motor plant, with four motors which cost several hundred thousand dollars. The town found it profitable to sell the motors at junk prices, bringing less than ten per cent of original cost. By buying current from VEPCO, it was able to reduce its rather high rate considerably. But the people are now clamoring for lower rates, after learning of the rates paid by cus-

tomers of VEPCO. While it may be difficult to determine the actual profits that come to the town for electricity, Belhaven did get one benefit out of selling its motors, some of which have not yet been removed. and not profits, enabled the town which comes from the current

Here is a comparison of commercial rates of Vepco, Belhaven, and those now in effect on Roanoke Island, based on a consumption of 400 kw hours.

Roanóke Island 22.60

5.50 6.30 profits would be made, the rate must go up to the Belhaven rate, which is now a subject of complaint, and is higher than either Roanoke or Vepco. But it must be remembered that Belhaven is no yardstick at all by which Manteo's prospects can be measured. Belhaven is a town of 2.500 people while Manteo has less than 500 in its corporate limits.
