

AUDITOR SHOWS GENERAL FUND DEFICIT \$50,882

Last Report Reveals General Fund Running Heavily Behind Two Years Ago

As predicted by this newspaper two years ago that the Dare County General fund would show a heavy deficit, if, as and when an audit should be made. The audit has finally been made without an explanation for the long delay, and the audit says the deficit in the General Fund as of June 30th had accumulated to \$50,882.77, and, in the auditor's words: "It is imperative that this deficit be eliminated and not be allowed to accumulate in the future."

The audit was made by R. O. Howard, CPA of Belhaven, N. C., and is the last form of audit made of county funds. It was delivered to the Commissioners last week. If
